



Most of you know that the Assembly passed AB435 (for the second time) on September 28, 2021 by votes of 59 in favor to 39 against.

The Senate education committee recommended SB431 on September 24 2021, Ayes 4 Noes 3. We are currently waiting for the Senate to send it to the floor for the vote. They have had some floor sessions, but this Bill was not addressed. I spoke to Senator Darling's aide on October 20th and he is still optimistic that they will present it in one of the next floor sessions prior to November 11th. He did not think we needed to make any phone calls just yet, but if that becomes necessary, he will inform me. <u>Updates will be posted on the GFWC-WI website.</u>

Therefore, we continue to wait and hope and pray for a positive outcome.



The Civic Engagement & Outreach Challenge Project is to support and aid women veterans. GFWC Clubs can connect with women veterans to support health needs, reduce isolation and depression, and provide comfort and encouragement with the assistance of Women Veterans Program Manager at your VA Medical Center.

Some specific ideas provided by WVP Manager:

- Donate comfort and useful items such as soothing lotions and bath gels, beauty products, cozy socks and slippers, adult inspirational coloring books and colored pencils (a great favorite!), games and playing cards, and/or gift cards to salons, coffee shops, and retail and grocery stores.
- Supply beverages and snacks for the waiting area of the Veteran Women's Health Clinic, with a small group of members hosting to provide camaraderie and new contacts.
- Collect new and slightly used jewelry and hold a club social for polishing and packaging the jewelry in decorated boxes or bags for distribution at the Veteran Women's Health Clinic.
- Work with the Veterans Administration Medical Center to hold a games afternoon or painting social. Make new friends and have fun!
- Coordinate with the WVP Manager to help women veterans celebrate special moments in their lives with gifts and thoughtful cards for new babies, family birthdays and other meaningful occasions.

Tina Reese's monthly newsletters as the international chairman of education and libraries, are chock full of information regarding education. Tina lists several STEM activities that can be done with students although our school is not allowing outside help yet. Tina also called attention to bully prevention month and national disability awareness. There is a 24-page disability awareness packet available online. I found Tina's selection for the club creativity project honorable mention from an Ohio Juniors WC interesting: They created 25 days of holiday readings when Santa had to be quarantined. This was done by Zoom with a drawing for prizes done each evening.

Keep learning!

Environment

Fall has finally arrived and many of you (and I) are looking forward to the holiday season. If you are getting a new wreath or other live plant remember to you can compost green matter and recycle metal/plastic pieces. Plants such as amaryllis can be replanted outdoors in spring and poinsettias can be cut back and put outside when its warm enough; remember to water them thoroughly. Live trees can be donated to local conservation clubs for fish nests.

Replacing your lights with new LED'S, consider donating good lights to a school or other organizations. Lights not in good condition, look for a store that recycles them. Next - all those wrappings and trimmings—re-use any paper/bags or recycle .Foil paper is not recyclable but is the best for re-using. Re-use bows and ribbons or eliminate them altogether. Packaging can usually be recycled, you may have to separate plastic from paper and don't put the ties in recycling as they clog the sorting belts. Also keep caps on water and other bottles. Holiday cards can be used for table name cards and package labels or donate them to organizations that repurpose them.

As we are coming to the end of the reporting year I would like to remind all clubs to donate to Trees For Tomorrow and report it under Environment.



As the holidays approach, many people react with mixed feelings. Some people enjoy every moment of togetherness and preparation; some people find this to be a stressful time. The perfect holiday with smiling faces, "Hallmark" decorations, and gourmet food may be the goal, but it is rarely reality. Remember to practice gratitude and take time to relax during these hectic times.

Many clubs feel that they only need to report "the big projects" or the ones that donate the most money or goods. Every project is important.

Here are some simple projects that members can do.

- Do you reward your club members for taking care of themselves? One club had a raffle in October and the only "payment" was if they were up to date with their yearly mammogram or had one scheduled.

- Would members like to become a pen pal with a resident in a retirement community or assisted living facility? Many residents would be thrilled to receive a card or mail.
- https://shotatlife.org/ is the link to Shot@Life. This site has multiple involvement ideas.
- Members can set a personal "fitness" goal. For example, one member's goal may be to walk around the block three days a week for a month; another's goal may be to take a weekly exercise class; or another's goal may be to run a local 5K. Set a timeline and create a celebration for those who reach their goals.
- If members are willing to share, keep track of personal donations to GFWC Partners and include these in your club reports.

Jack LaLanne said, "Your body is your most priceless possession. Take care of it." Remember to take care of yourself.

Planning is underway for our next Mini LEADS session to be held at Winter Workshop in February. Watch for the details and registration information for the session which will be included with the Call to Winter Workshop in January.

Let me take this opportunity to remind you of two important leadership initiatives for Wisconsin clubs and clubwomen!

First, it is time for each club to give thoughtful consideration to identifying a clubwoman to nominate as Wisconsin's 2022 LEADS candidate. It is indeed an honor to be considered so I encourage all clubs to submit an applicant. The informational document and application are included in this issue on the next three pages and is posted in the leadership section of the GFWC-WI website.

Also, this is the time of year when we begin to organize and focus our efforts on year-end report writing. While preparing for your club's report on Leadership, consider that everything we do requires leadership...club meetings, board meetings, bylaws review, mentoring/training and education (GFWC-WI Mini LEADS participation/GFWC LEADS applicant), attending District and State meetings, holding positions of leadership within the various levels of GFWC, organizing events and activities, collaboration with other community organizations and serving in positions of volunteer leadership within the community. We launched a new leadership reporting form last year which outlines the specific criteria that will be reported by this chair to encapsulate our Wisconsin 2021 endeavors. I ask that you please be mindful of the criteria as you report on your club's leadership activities and remember, we are counting on you.

We want 100% participation for leadership reporting!!





GFWC Leadership Education and Development Seminar (LEADS)

Information for GFWC State Federations – Customized for GFWC-WI 2022

The GFWC LEADS program is intended to identify GFWC members at the grassroots level who have the potential and the desire to assume leadership positions in GFWC beyond their club. Participation in GFWC LEADS can help these members gain the capabilities, confidence and commitment necessary to pursue and achieve higher office and serve with distinction. The LEADS program is held annually (Friday, June 24, 2022) the day before the official opening of the GFWC International Convention (Saturday, June 25 – Monday, June 27, 2022 in New Orleans, LA). LEADS is a full day of activities, and includes breakfast and lunch. Participants become LEADS graduates at the conclusion of the day-long program.

Some important details are as follows:

- One attendee each year from each State Federation is eligible to participate in LEADS.
- GFWC will cover a portion of the attendees' expenses, including:
 - Round-trip travel to and from the GFWC Convention city, up to \$250
 - Lodging allowance of one-half of room charge for two nights at official Convention hotel
 - Breakfast and lunch during the LEADS program
- Checks will be distributed to candidates upon attendance and completion of the seminar.
- State Federations may consider underwriting a portion of attendee's expenses (i.e. additional lodging, meals, or Convention registration). *GFWC-WI supports our candidate by underwriting up to \$1,000 of eligible expenses*.
- LEADS attendees are expected to be responsible for a portion of their expenses as an affirmation of their personal commitment.
- The LEADS participant is responsible for making her own travel and lodging arrangements.

(Note for GFWC-WI: In prior years a LEADS welcome reception occurs on Thursday evening and a LEADS breakfast occurs on Saturday morning. Watch for details regarding these events in the convention program and plan your travel accordingly.)

CONTENT & PRESENTATIONS AT LEADS

LEADS may include the following:

- Presentations on conflict resolution, mediation, public speaking skills, time management, parliamentary procedure
- Explanation of GFWC resources, materials, and assistance
- Discussions on GFWC policies, procedures, and parliamentary law
- Tips and techniques for pursuing leadership opportunities

CRITERIA FOR PARTICIPATING IN LEADS

It is highly recommended that each state candidate for LEADS:

- Demonstrates leadership capabilities at the club level as an active club president, club officer, or club project or committee chairman.
- Exhibits a commitment to Federation.
- Exhibits an understanding of the GFWC mission of community service, illustrated by programs and projects in which she is or has been involved.
- Demonstrates leadership skills, including, but not limited to, organization, responsibility, trustworthiness, enthusiasm, and flexibility.
- Exhibits an interest in and willingness to pursue higher leadership positions in Federation.
- Understands and accepts potential expenses involved in participation.
- Has not held elected positions at or beyond the state level. This criterion is recommended in order to encourage potential leaders at the club level to apply.
- ♦ Has not attended a previous LEADS program. Members are eligible to attend only once.
- Agrees to share information gained from participation in LEADS with others in the state.
- Agrees to the following additional criteria established for GFWC-WI:
 - * Agrees to serve and actively participate on the GFWC-WI Leadership Committee and contribute to the GFWC-WI Mini LEADS Presentation Team.
 - * Beginning in 2020, preference in the selection of the GFWC-WI LEADS candidate will be given to GFWC-WI Mini LEADS graduates.


