



simply click on "Sign Up", the GFWC HQ team are always available to help with your sign up. Need local help with signing up, contact me via email.



WOL in a nutshell:

1948 - The idea for the collection of books written by Wisconsin authors was the brainchild of Mary Rennebohm, wife of our 32nd Governor. Originally dubbed 'Wisconsin's Own Authors', initially housed at the Executive Mansion, Madison.

1950 - outgrew space - Mrs. Rennebohm persuaded the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs to be a sponsor and it has been a state project for our organization ever since.

The collection moved several times due to space constraints. From the Executive Mansion the collection went to the 2nd floor of the Humanities Room at UW-Madison's Memorial Library.

1967 - The collection was moved to the State Historical Society.

1980 - Next it moved to the Resource Center Library of Information and Science at UW-Milwaukee. Concerned that this room had no controlled humidity, the collection was deemed at risk.

1986 - Wisconsin's Own Library, as is now known expanded to include works produced by Wisconsin illustrators and found its next home in the Colonel Robert H. Morse Library, Beloit College.

2007 - Our State President, Kay Salewske took an active role in securing the Lane Library on the beautiful Ripon College campus as the next, current, and hopefully final home of our prized collection which contained over 5,000 volumes. The Wisconsin's Own Library changed from a reference collection to a circulating collection except for several rare volumes which do not go out for loan and are being carefully preserved to retain their value.

Wisconsin's Own Library has become a collection of hard and soft covered books, written, edited, illustrated, or compiled by a Wisconsin person, either born here or one who established residency here in the State at some time in his or her life.

2017 - present - GFWC-WI became the recipient of generous disbursements from the Gwendolyn M. Schultz Charitable Trust. These funds have allowed us to follow her wishes to provide support to, and preserve the works of, worthy Wisconsin writers, provide biographical and other historical information about the writers, and make this information public, and to finally fulfill Mrs. Mary Rennebohm's similar desire.

Most recent - GFWC Wisconsin has focused on poetry created by Wisconsin writers. With funds provided by the Gwendolyn M. Schultz Trust, GFWC-Wisconsin is sponsoring a poet-in-residence at Ripon College.

We look forward to continuing our successful and symbiotic relationship with Lane Library at Ripon College, and toward building stronger partnerships with the Wisconsin Poet Laureate Commission and the Woodland Pattern Book Center.



Children are transformed with a humble piece of material around their shoulders and tap into the power of their imaginations!



Education and Libraries



I hope you are reading the monthly letters from Tina Daniel, Chairman of Education and Libraries for the current GFWC term. You'll find her letters under resources in the club manual. She provides suggestions for activities your club could undertake as well as books to read and lots of information.

I was reading the Spring 2021 issue of the Clubwoman and took a quick

review of the resolutions that will be presented at the national GFWC Convention at Atlanta. Under Education and Libraries there is a proposed new resolution that deals with education of children raised in foster care.

Studies show that approximately 40% of children in foster care have educational difficulties; are three times more likely to drop out of high school when compared to other low-income children, and only 50% of foster care children obtain a high school diploma.

Resolved, that the GFWC urges its member clubs to advocate for legislation that allows children in foster care the option of remaining in the foster care system until they either obtain a high school diploma or reach the age at which they are no longer entitled to a free public education.

It urges clubs to collaborate with local school districts and foster care agencies to provide scholarships to complete a GED program and obtain post-secondary education.

Environment

The Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program recently purchased 221 acres of land in Oneida County and 12,497 acres of easement to preserve natural areas . This acreage protects the environment, promotes tourism and is open to hunting (prevents over grazing and browsing). This program was in jeopardy as late as February of this year. Our state legislators put aside their differences to keep the program going. So far this acreage is only open to foot traffic and it would be nice if it stayed that way. The Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund also purchased acreage for the Ice

Age Glacial Drummond Trail (foot traffic only) and the shoreline footage next to Devils Lake State Park. History of Knowles-Nelson Stewardship: In 1971 the state legislators created this fund in honor of Republican Governor Warren P. Knowles and Gaylord Nelson a Democrat, both were champions of conservation. Make sure you let your representatives know you endorse this program.

With the recent recall of a sunblock containing a possible carcinogen we are reminded to read what we put on our bodies as well as in them.

Advancement Area: Leadership Submitted by: Kia Kjensrud, Leadership Committee Member

The 10 Commandments of Effective Leadership Skills

In order to lead effectively in your club, you will have to work on a balance and on key skills to grow as a leader. Some of these attributes may come naturally, and others need to be cultivated. These are the top 10 skills you need to consider:

1. Adaptation to change - We know that members come and go within our club, district, state and national organizations. You probably won't "match" personalities with every person you meet, but if you keep in mind that all of us have the hearts of volunteers, and should be treated kindly, it makes our relationships much easier. As a leader, you need to know how to adapt to these changes, whether or not it comes naturally to you or not. You can work on social skills that will help you lead more effectively.

2. Vision - Effective leaders keep the overall goals of the organization in mind, even while investing time in the individuals who make the organization tick. It's always helpful to be on top of what's going on with other clubs, new ideas to try, and ways to help keep your organization fresh and relevant.

3. Reflection - Effective leadership skills have a lot to do with thinking about the part you play in your organization and looking at how people are working together. Good leaders recognize ways they can improve not only themselves and encourage a spirit of cooperation.

4. Member needs - If there is something that an organization should care about, it is its members. Your leadership role should be focused on meeting their needs so that you can ensure your club's growth in the medium and long term.

5. Best use of resources - Effective leadership skills are supported by an appropriate use of material, human and financial resources, so that results are obtained in the most efficient and optimized way.

6. Effective communication - It is impossible to lead efficiently if you don't work on your communication skills. Here, your listening skills and your expertise when transmitting the messages to your members both come into play. The key is to communicate transparently and clearly.

7. Conflict management - If you are a leader, you have a responsibility not only to solve the conflicts that will be inevitable within your club, but also to be able to detect them before it is too late to fix them. In conflict resolution it is essential to know your peers. Ask, listen to different versions, show empathy and act with justice.

8. Delegate and encourage teamwork - Your effective leadership skills will be better the more you encourage teamwork and delegate certain tasks to the right person. Delegating effectively will help develop the potential of your club members and increase the confidence and sense of belonging of the group.

9. Emotional intelligence and positive attitude - A good leader a good "self leader" - a person with a positive attitude and emotional intelligence, who will manage stress well and accept constructive criticism. Building confidence and keeping optimism alive will get you out of tense situations and it will be especially valuable to develop and improve the skills of your team.

10. Productivity and time management - Learn to prioritize your tasks, set and define goals, meet deadlines and, in short, don't overcommit! It's easy to do when you want to help, but don't burn yourself out. It's not healthy for you, and it's not what should be expected of your club women.

At our February 2021 Board of Directors meeting the Technology Committee was formed.

We have seven members representing a cross section of our state both from a club and leadership perspective. I want to thank Sue Bednarek, Deb Brossard, Abby Lorenz, Lora McPhillips, Michelle Munoz, and Sharon Phelps for volunteering.



The committee has met three times so far with another meeting planned for September.

Our accomplishments so far include:

1 – Defining goals

Committee goals include an inventory component for our state, a Board of Directors position turnover component, and an education component for club members.

2 – State Inventory

The committee initiated an inventory of hardware, software, and online technologies that are either owned or used by the state leadership. The committee is in the process of reviewing the documentation for completeness.

The committee also drafted a suggested Technology Policy Statement which was sent to the Amendment and Policies Committee for their review in the coming year.

3 - Board of Directors Position Turnover

Resolutions Committee

What are Resolutions? Resolutions are a tool for GFWC-WI clubs to advocate important issues at local, state and national issues.

Why do we have resolutions?

GFWC-WI wants to encourage member clubs to make an impact on their community through civic participation; and to encourage members to network with other groups and establish coalitions for public policy and legislative initiatives; and to encourage members to promote awareness, debate, and action on pending legislation.

Why do we have to read them aloud and vote on each one separately at state conventions?

All resolutions which have been in force for four years must be reviewed by committee every four years. Things, times, language, and interests change. Sometimes, like at the 2021 Convention, we rescind all or part of a resolution. We do them separately so that every person has an opportunity to have a voice on a single issue.

Where do resolutions come from?

Surprise, surprise! They come from YOU! Any club member, with permission of her club, may present a resolution to the Resolution Committee. If the Resolutions Committee feels it is of worth, the Resolutions Committee presents the resolution to the Executive Committee. With approval of the Executive Committee, the resolution is presented to the Board of Directors at the Winter Workshop. If approved by the Board of Directors, the resolution is presented with the Call to Convention for all members to read in preparation for the Convention.

What are some of our newest resolutions?

In 2010 we adopted a resolution on Cancer Prevention. In 2011 it was a resolution on Bullying. In 2018 there were three new resolutions: Opioids, Human Trafficking and Cursive Writing Reinstatement.




