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## What Are GFWC-WI and GFWC Awards?

Annually, clubs are asked to provide a statistical report on the club's efforts the previous calendar year. Statistics are compiled at the national level allowing GFWC to lobby for issues pertinent to the membership, apply for grants and develop affiliations with national organizations. These statistics are important to the continued impact of GFWC. All clubs should make every effort to report.

In addition to the statistics, clubs are encouraged to capture the stories of their programs in narratives used as submissions for award consideration. These narrative award submissions tell the history of a club and ultimately the history of GFWC-WI. Often, these stories are referred to as Reporting. And Reporting is the means by which GFWC-WI is able to recognize and acknowledge outstanding services the clubs provide to their communities.

Awards are presented to clubs who submit reports in special, program, advancement, committee, and contest areas. The awards are determined by the chairs of the program areas, advancement areas, committees, and contest chairs. The chairs are appointed by the GFWC-WI President and serve on the GFWC-WI Board of Directors. The chairs serve two-year terms. Chairs may be reappointed by the next president but are limited to two two-year terms by GFWC-WI Policies.

The GFWC-WI distributes awards at two category levels: Category I is for clubs with 30 or more members.

In each category, the chair selects the club which has documented the best overall performance in that area and the club that has the best single project of all the projects submitted in the reports. Thus, each chair reports four award honorees to the Second Vice President. These clubs are then recognized at the annual state convention.

Category II is for clubs with less than 30 members.

Individual awards based on nominations are granted for Jenny June, Woman of Achievement, Theodora Youmans, LEADS, and Junior of the

# Community Impact Program Award

The newly updated GFWC Community Impact Program Award offers GFWC clubs financial incentive to implement projects designed to impact a specific problem in their community. The CIP Award is designed to accommodate the many ways that clubs currently function and to provide added flexibility in the implementation of up to three projects that have a meaningful impact on a particular problem, from "done in a day" efforts to those that could require more rigorous planning and implementation. This award is given once every two year period. This award covers Jan 1, 2020 to Dec. 31, 2021.

### **GFWC Amery Woman's Club**

Polk County Recycling Center: The Amery Woman's Club recognized that the Polk County Administration wanted to close down the County Recycling Center because they felt it was not profitable. The club would not take closing as an answer! Its inspiration came from a club member who also represents club members as a Polk County Supervisor. With the AWC in GFWC red shirts attending a Polk County Board Meeting, the club proposed that the recycling center stay open and be upgraded with available state funds of \$1.6 million. Several members of the club spoke several times at the county meetings. One of the members who is a county supervisor published letters to the editor of the Amery Free Press in support of keeping the center open. With this information on available funding, the Polk County Board voted unanimously to dedicate state funds to upgrade and retain the Polk County Recycling Center. The club's voice and presence were acknowledged! The Polk County Recycling Center provides jobs, saves the environment, and shows that Polk County can be a leader in Recycling. In addition, the club passed and put in place a resolution to recognize and encourage participation in conservation education and programs.



Year. These awards recognize individual excellence. The nomination process is specified on the GFWC-WI website.

Honors at the GFWC International Level are awarded based on the number of members that a state has reported to GFWC International at the beginning of the two-year term of the current president. Regardless of changes in membership, the state stays in the same category for the full two years. GFWC International places the states in one of six categories in evaluating all award submissions sent by GFWC Special Program, Community Service Area, and Advancement Area chairs. Wisconsin is in Category II for awards presented at the 2021 and 2022 International Conventions.

The GFWC-WI President compiles all of the statistical information from all of the reports in all of the community service, special program, and advancement areas and submits that information to GFWC International. In addition to selecting the state awards, the chair of each area submits two reports to GFWC International: a State Award Entry which is a list, with narratives, of the top ten projects in Wisconsin that that had the most impact; and a Club Creativity Entry which is a narrative of one project. GFWC International issues monetary awards for the Most Creative in each State and the Community Impact Awards.

Each year, GFWC accumulates the total number of reported projects, volunteer hours, and both in-kind and dollars donated for the work of its clubs. It also assembles a Top Ten Projects list by area for clubs to reference as an idea generator. The most recent data is available in the 2020 Annual Program Statistics Report which has more detail. See the News & Publications tab at the GFWC website (https://www.gfwc.org).

The statistical reporting and narratives become the recorded history of each state and of each club and is also a tool in preserving the history of women in our society. Those annual club reports and narratives are valuable far and wide!

Pat has been a pillar of the community long before she became a member of the GFWC Stevens Point Woman's Club. She began her Fuzzy Friends Forever project many years ago. She refurbishes and cleans gently used toys, especially stuffed animals, pairs them with a matching book, and donates them to Operation Bootstrap, a nearby charitable organization whose primary purpose is to meet the basic needs of others. Her efforts toward this project have been featured in two publications: Catholic Life -- The Roman Catholic Diocese of LaCrosse and in Wisconsin Life. To date, Pat has cleaned and mended over 26,000 animals and books that are then donated to nonprofits including schools and churches to be given to children. In 2021, Pat averaged 21 hours a week and donated an average of \$50 per week in supplies to her mission. Pat began her career as a nurse and she continued at St. Michael's Hospital in Stevens Point. There she quietly took on shifts so that those with young families could be home on the holidays. Even after retirement, she coordinated and hosted meetings with coworkers that she connected to needs in the community. During the COVID pandemic, she took in homeless people to live with her for almost two years. Not only the couple, but their children, dogs, boyfriends and more! She has two adult children.

# Theodora Youmans Citizenship Award

The Theodora Youmans Citizenship Award is one of the most treasured awards given by GFWC-Wisconsin since 1937. At its onset, Mrs. Youmans provided in her will that the award should be made for the most honorable contribution to citizenship. This award recipient need not be a member of a GFWC-WI woman's club. There is only one winner, but it is an honor to be nominated. The award's namesake was born Theodora Winton in Ashippun, Wisconsin in 1863. She was raised in New Berlin where her father was a merchant. In 1889, she married Henry Youmans, Editor of the Waukesha *Freeman*. In 1898 she was elected President of the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs. Her influence had a marked bearing on Federation policies and growth for many years. She was a woman who worked tirelessly for women. Following her death in April 1932, a reporter for the Waukesha *Freeman* wrote: "We find a remarkable combination of talents and abilities in one woman that gave her predominance among women and men alike."



Reading to Children at Local Day Care Facilities. An ongoing project of the GFWC Rhinelander Woman's Club is reading to children at local day care facilities. There were months that club members were not able to participate due to COVID 19. It fluctuated in 2021, yet the GFWC Rhinelander Woman's Club read to children at the local YMCA day care one or two times per month for close to 6 months. One member coordinated the scheduling of members and day care centers. Each member reader left two or 3 books that they had read at the day care every month. The books are purchased by the club. Through the experience children learn to sit quietly, listen, and learn skills for school readiness such as recalling the story, details and conclusions. The students respond to the stories and answer with the expected and creative outcomes. These are essential skills for a positive educational experience. A label noting the club donation is attached inside the front cover of every donated book. Members volunteer 33 hours and donated \$225 in books.



### **LEADS Candidate**

### (GFWC Leadership, Education and Development Seminar)

The GFWC LEADS program is intended to identify GFWC members at the grassroots level who have the potential and the desire to assume leadership positions in GFWC beyond their club. Participation in GFWC LEADS can help these members gain the capabilities, confidence and commitment necessary to pursue and achieve higher office and serve with distinction. The LEADS program is held annually the day before the official opening of the GFWC International Convention. Each state is allowed one candidate.

- Personal Essentials Pantry (PEP). This club donated \$1,500 to the PEP to purchase personal products for community distribution. In addition, members of the club helped to distribute the items.
- Children's Wisconsin. The club donated \$3,000 to the local family resource center at Children's Wisconsin for a parental support class called "Together Facing the Challenge."
- The Table Feeding Our Community. The club planned, prepared and served a
  preassembled meal for members of the community in September.

All parents were given two \$25 coupons for any type of apparel, including diapers and wipes. All children in fifth grade and younger received a \$15 toy coupon. Over 1,800 coupons were mailed. Food boxes included a twenty dollar meat coupon, doubling the value from prior years.



The Woman's Club of Pewaukee continues to create a community that accepts, understands, supports, and engages persons with dementia, their families, and caregivers. New this year the club designed a retractable banner that will be used at educational seminars and training sessions. Club members support caregivers by encouraging the use of resources found on the newly developed website for Dementia Friendly Pewaukee and visiting the Facebook page and Instagram postings. By collaborating with the local Aging and Disability Resource Center of Waukesha County, the Dementia Friendly Pewaukee Initiative is setting an example for other communities to bring awareness about Alzheimer's disease by offering a free 20-minute education presentation to train individuals and local businesses on the signs of dementia and how to effectively engage with persons with dementia and their loved ones with compassion, understanding and kindness.

- Little Lending Library. Courtesy of this club, there is now a new Little Lending Library in the village park. It was dreamed up, designed and built by a member and her husband, with decorating assistance from other club members. It was designed to be a replica of the historical little white schoolhouse that is currently a part of the park. A dedication ceremony was held in October.
- 2. **Capes for Kids.** This club went the extra mile with the State's Advocates for Children project, Capes for Kids. The club cooperated with the media at TMJ4 and were featured on a special program. This was a fantastic way to get the word out about GFWC and the Capes for Kids Project.

### Best Single Project -- It's a Tie!

### GFWC Stevens Point Woman's Club

Misfit "stuffies" bring new joy for children. This club could have an "island of misfit toys" for all the ripped and dirty collected stuffed toys that they have turned into beautiful giveaways to children. Also, a donated book is matched with each mended stuffed toy. Both the book and the mended stuffed toy is donated to schools, churches, hospitals, needy groups of children, Operation Bootstrap, and more. These clubwomen believe no child should be without these childhood comforts. Broken stuffed animals and books are collected throughout the year, especially during summer rummage sales. Time is spent washing, repairing, re-packaging, and shipping these items for distribution. One member has been working on this project for more than a decade.

### **GFWC Pleasant Prairie Woman's Club**

New Twist to Free Little Libraries. For years the members of this club donated hundreds of books to local elementary schools for free giveaway. During COVID 19, the schools shut down, but the club was still collecting books. A member and her son, looking for something new to read, started going to free little libraries around the area. They noticed supplies were running low, so the club decided to take all the collected books and fill up the little libraries. Printed labels said, "Donated by GFWC Pleasant Prairie Woman's Club" and included a link to their website. They made sure there were both children's and young adult books in each free library. By the end of 2021, 187 books were labeled and given to the free libraries in Kenosha and Pleasant Prairie.

### **GFWC Rhinelander Woman's Club**

5 Projects 87 Members 964 Hours \$4,396 Spent

- 1. **It's a Team Effort.** Officers, board members and committee members reported a total of 194 hours planning and preparing for meetings and work time in committees.
- 2. **GFWC LEADS.** This club nominated a LEADS candidate for GFWC and she was selected. The club paid her \$150 registration fee for the LEADS seminar in Atlanta, Georgia.
- 3. **Reporting is a Project in Itself.** Club members reported 207 hours devoted to tallying hours and writing project stories.
- 4. **Financial Stewardship is Leadership!** The club reviews its financial records every year as well as its investments. Seven club members dedicate 105 hours toward the club's granting program. In addition, this year the club treasurer devoted 80 hours to creating a treasurer's handbook.

This club has taken steps to re-evaluate its club projects, meeting schedules, programs, social events, member communication process, and membership dedication. ### **GFWC Amery Woman's Club**

2 Projects 45 Hours \$20 Spent

- Amery and Polk County Politics. The Amery Woman's Club has been an active voice in local politics. We have been well represented with members being on City Administration, Alderwoman, and County Board member. Since March of 2020, meetings have been held on line and many of Amery's members tuned in to voice their concerns.
- 2. Polk County Recycling Center. The Amery Club recognized that the Polk County Administration wanted to close down the County Recycling Center because they felt it was not profitable. The Amery Women, in their Red shirts, attended a Polk County Board Meeting and proposed that the recycling center stay open and be upgraded with available state funds of \$1.6 million. With this information, the Polk County Board voted unanimously to upgrade and retain the Polk County Recycling Center. The club's voice and presence were acknowledged.

### **Best Single Project**

### GFWC Muskego Woman's Club

**Public Forum.** The Muskego Woman's Club sponsored and moderated a two -hour question-and-answer voter education session with all six candidates for Muskego Norway School Board. The forum was held at the City Hall, was advertised on Facebook by the City of Muskego and the Muskego Woman's Club, live streamed on the City's YouTube channel and made available to the city residents until election day. The program was a resounding success! The current school board president personally contacted the club by email. "I want to express my sincere appreciation to the Muskego Woman's Club for sponsoring and doing such a great job getting this together so quickly. Absolutely awesome job!" In addition, a voter took the time to email the club and said, "I just wanted to thank you for sponsoring, coordinating, and moderating the Muskego School Board candidate forum. It was very helpful to see all the candidates and hear their positions on various issues. You did a great job and a great service to our community." Initially, the club was hesitant to do the Forum because of COVID precautions. However, the Mayor requested them to reconsider, and in a few short days they invited candidates, wrote a script, scrutinized a list of issues, wrote questions and worked with City Hall tech services to put it together.
