GFWC-WI President's Report to the Board

This president approached this report to you from the major facets of the role. It is the president's job to understand the roles and tasks of all the committees. From the outset, this administration was dedicated to activities that advanced the Strategic Plan, purposefully appointing NEW board members to encourage leadership development, supporting the districts and clubs in any way these autonomous groups needed or wanted, and committing the time needed to ensure club presidents and members had the access that would help them become comfortable enough to ask for help, or favors, or to simply run ideas in their myriad ways to enhance their clubs.

Rather than a chronology, this report is by area in the hopes it conveys the optimistic commitment and excitement expressed at the installation speech.

Our great state has been represented at these amazing events:

- GFWC International Convention for a week in New Orleans
- The August 2022 multi-day GFWC board meeting in Washington, D.C.
- Hosted a 5-day Great Lakes Region Conference

Planned and conducted the following governance sessions:

- Executive Committee meetings in July 2022, September 2022, November 2022, February 2023, April 2023, and May 2023
- Board meetings in September 2022 in the Northwoods District, February 2023 in the Rivers and Lakes District and May 2023 in the Northern Lights District
- And now, this marvelous annual state convention in May 2023 in the Northern Lights District

In addition, the following workshops were planned and held:

- September 2022 in Stevens Point using a breakout seminar session format and with multiple speakers
- February 2023 in Green Bay that included a remarkable 3-hour Emotional Intelligence session conducted by Missy Kimball and the Leadership Committee, that included several planning sessions, a speaker and a service project, and a delightful surprise visit by GFWC International President Deb Strahanoski (all wonderfully and secretly planned by our State Treasurer)

District speaking engagements included:

- 4 district meetings in October Lakeshore (Wauwatosa), RHD (Oconomowoc), Northern Lights (Colfax), Northwoods (Amherst Junction)
- 4 in April RHD (Delafield), Rivers and Lakes (Green Lake), SPD (Monroe), Northwoods (Antigo)

Committee meetings and support of our board leaders is critical. This resulted in participating in:

- A 2-night Mini LEADS held on Zoom
- An open house day at Wisconsin's Own Library at Ripon College and 6 committee Zoom meetings
- 3 Investment Committee sessions to review the status of the investments and to recraft the guidance document
- Multiple Zoom meetings related to the Website redesign
- Design discussions and proofreading the 2 editions of the WI Clubwoman
- Zoom session and emails with the Amendments & Policies committee to prepare for the Winter Workshop committee meeting
- Re-establishing an Ad Hoc Technology Committee and participating in setting work targets
- Attended the GFWC six-session PowerUp Webinars for Legislation and Public Policy and incorporated parts of the information in district speaking engagements

GFWC-WI PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD

A source of pride for this administration is working toward the Strategic Plan. At the start of the fiscal year, an all-member survey was distributed. More than 200 members responded, which is a tremendous response rate for a membership of fewer than 1500!

The results of the survey instantly affected the material presented at the workshops, recast the perspective on how to plan meetings and provided an overview of the changes in member opinions since the last survey in 2014.

Members were VERY clear. The top three reasons to attend a convention were, in order – learning something new, speakers, meeting other club women. The traditional items of Vendors, Fundraising and Awards did not even make the top 10! You'll see some subtle changes in this convention in a direct the impressive complexity and continued health of response to WHAT MEMBERS WANTED.

The top two concerns are meeting cost and location. This administration is focused on making certain meetings are held throughout the state AND every effort is made to have average daily cost below \$80 based on average attendance levels from the last 5 years.

All these touch points, **NOT** including about 15 trips for site visits in 5 of the districts to firm up meeting venues, several phone calls each day, the 100's and 100's of hours dealing with email, or attendance at regular club meetings, resulted in an impressive 22 in -state visits in 50 weeks.

- Lakeshore –2 visits
- Northern Lights 2 visits
- Northwoods 5 visits
- Rivers and Lakes 6 visits
- Rolling Hills 4 visits
- Southern Prairies 5 visits

There were crushing disappointments in receiving notices from Edgerton and Amherst Junction with plans to disband despite last minute efforts for member drives, and no longer seeing some wonderful friends at meetings as their health fails.

There were amazing successes that include forming a beautiful new Juniorette club in Kenosha, seeing district meeting attendance range from 25-57 women, and bringing new talent onto the GFWC-WI board. Membership had a net increase of nearly 100 members with last fall's dues. New presidents are

stepping forward in several clubs. And we hear from schools this next generation is incredibly service oriented – it is up to us to have the programs and projects and a way for them to volunteer that make sense to THEM.

The annual report to GFWC Headquarters rolled our reported volunteer hours for 2022 at nearly 96,000! Congratulations to all the amazing women pouring themselves into their community efforts.

The organization's finances are healthy, thanks to the relentless dedication and work of the women before us. This Executive Committee has a strong fiduciary sense to preserve the health of the organization. Thank you for your attention. Rest assured, this president and this administration are committed to GFWC-WI.

In 2020, during COVID, art teachers had difficulty teaching art when students did not have materials. The Digital Artwork Category was added to the Art Contest to make it accessible and relevant. My nephew in LA, Erin Epping, and Diane Stoiber were very helpful as I set up this new Digital category.

The first year I was pleasantly surprised with Digital entries in Class A and Class B; every example was submitted so it could be viewed on a screen. In the 2nd year there were submittals in Class A & B. However, some were no longer submitted in digital format. I overlooked the discrepancy and allowed all pieces to be judged as submitted. This year, the 3rd year, there were NO Class B entries and only 2 schools in the State Contest submitted any digital work, some of which were submitted in a print format and could not be viewed on a screen. However, those pieces were judged.

Since COVID has subsided, the Digital Category has taken a backseat to the two traditional categories. Art teachers & students have returned to working with actual art materials for drawing, painting, and sculpture. Even the Art teachers who contacted me to introduce Digital Art are no longer submitting any Digital artwork!

Based on our 3-year experience, we will discontinue the Digital Category.

The website materials for the Helen Farnsworth Mears Art Contest will be updated, removing the Digital Category. It would be wonderful to increase the number of clubs participating in the Art Contest, now in its 97th year. First, I want to thank everyone who brought flower seeds to the state meeting. We had over 200 packets of seeds that went to a good home.

Second, I have a big concern that all of you could help with. Our butterflies and bees are dying at an alarming rate. The biggest culprit is toxic pesticides found in Round Up. It not only causes cancer in humans, but it is killing our butterflies and bees. Their numbers have continued falling, an example is the Eastern Monarch butterfly declined by 22% and the

Rustic Bumble Bee by 95%. Round Up kills the milkweed that butterflies depend on, and in fact they only eat milkweed when they hatch. So, I am pleading with you to say no to Round

Up and any other pesticides you use. As an alternative use a mixture of vinegar and dawn dish soap, it works wonders. No bees, no food, no life.

What can I do to reduce my risk of Skin Cancer?

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. There are various types of skin cancer. The most common types are basal cell skin cancer, squamous

cell, melanoma and Merkel cell, unfortunately the list goes on. So, what can we do?

First, don't think it is only summertime, or sunny days to be concerned about our risk for skin cancer. Protection from UV rays is important all year. UV rays are the strongest from 10am-4pm. The UV index forecasts the strength of the UV rays each day. If the UV index is 3 or higher in your area, protect your skin from too much exposure to the sun. So, how do I protect my skin from too much sun exposure?

- **Shade** you can reduce your risk by staying in the shade. If that is not possible, consider using an umbrella to offer you shade.
- **Clothing-** when possible, wear long sleeved shirts which can protect you from the UV rays.
- **Hats** for the most protection wear a hat with a brim all the way around that will shade your face, ears, and the back of your neck.

- Sunglasses- sunglasses protect your eyes from UV rays and reduce the risk of cataracts.
- Sunscreen- Utilize broad spectrum sunscreen that filters out both UVA and UVB rays and has an SPF of 15 or higher. Obviously, higher numbers offer increased protection. It does wear off, so make sure to reapply after being out in the sun for more than 2 hours and after swimming. Do make sure to check expiration dates on your sunscreen, most have a shelf life of under 3 years.

In closing, enjoy the rest of summer, but be mindful of the UV rays. Being outside is wonderful and makes us feel good, we just need to remember to take care of ourselves and make sure our skin is protected.
